In response to the widespread destruction caused by the recent wildfires in Texas, the SPAG network and its supporters organized a relief effort known as "In the Line of Fire." As part of the South Plains Disaster Recovery Fund, this initiative functioned as a mechanism for citizens in the region to donate to wildfire relief efforts.

Perryman Report Anticipates Growth for High Plains Economy





The Perryman Group, an economic and financial analysis firm, recently released the Perryman Report as a public service. The following excerpt from the report highlights the High Plains Region:

The High Plains
Region covers a vast
area and is comprised
of 41 counties. Also included in the region are
two major metropolitan
statistical areas (MSAs)
—Amarillo and
Lubbock.

The High Plains Region is home to approximately 824,440 residents and represents 3.21% of the state's population. The region

also accounts for 3.38% of all wage and salary jobs in Texas and generates around 2.47% of the real gross product (RGP or output) in the state. Over the short term (2011-2016), the area is expected to see an increase in population of about 24,580 which represents a compound annual growth rate (CAGR) of 0.59%.

Job creation in the High Plains Region remains strong and is forecast to grow by 37,000 jobs at a 1.90% CAGR during the same period. Real retail sales is expected to increase by more than \$2.44 billion, a CAGR of 4.12%. The diverse business climate of the High Plains Region is attractive to many industries.

In Lubbock, the city's economic development organization was recently recognized for its recruitment of silicon wafer manufacturer X-Fab. The project could create 150 jobs for the area over a five-year period.

Although drought conditions have been a drain on the region's agriculture sector, the Panhandle stands strong in the dairy and beef industries. According to a US Department of Agriculture report, eight of the state's top ten milk producing counties are located in the region.

Brownfield, Idalou & Plainview Receive 2011 CDBG Awards

The cities of Brownfield, Idalou and Plainview were all notified that they have received 2011 CDBG funding to make water, sewer and street improvements. These awards began October 1st. 2011 and are the first awards out of the new Office of Rural Affairs (formerly the **Texas Department of** Rural Affairs) within the Texas Department of Agriculture.

Each TxCDBG award is \$275,000. The City of Brownfield will use

the funds to make street improvements within the community. The City of Plainview received the award to make improvements to the water system. The City of Idalou will make improvements to the streets and the water system.

Each of these projects were submitted for prioritization in September



2010 for the 2011/2012 CDBG cycle by the Regional Services Department at SPAG. Projects are regionally based on multiple factors including community need, poverty rate and leverage.

The South Plains Association of Governments Regional Services Department wrote each of these applications and will administer them as well. For more information on the TxCDBG program, please contact the Regional Services Department.

Idalou Receives 2011 Downtown Revitalization Grant from TDA

The City of
Idalou has been
awarded a 2011
Downtown Revitalization Program
(DRP) grant from the
Texas Department of
Agriculture. The City
will receive \$103,120
from TDA to make
improvements to

their downtown including sidewalk, curb and gutter, ADA and lighting updates.

This grant was submitted by the SPAG Regional Services



Department in July 2011 and began in October. The City will have 2 years to complete the project.

Tahoka Awarded Grant for Water System Improvements

In addition to the other regional CDBG awards, the City of Tahoka was notified late in the grant application review cycle that they will also be receiving an award for water system improvements. This award, totaling \$275,000, was written and will be administered by the Regional Services Department. As a community development grant, this project will benefit the citizens of Tahoka by funding improvements to the local water system infrastructure.

Caregiver Support Coordination @ SPAG

Caregiver Support Coordination is an ongoing process in SPAG's Area Agency on Aging (AAA.) Program activities include the assessment of both caregiver and carerecipient needs, coordination and followup of services, and identification of mutual needs as identified by the caregiver, care recipient and Caregiver Coordinator of SPAG/AAA.



This service is provided through cooperative

efforts between the Texas Department on Aging and Area Agencies on Aging. SPAG, the designated Area Agency on Aging, serves senior citizens living in the fifteen-county region of the South Plains. These services are provided free of charge, and include: respite vouchers, emergency response system, residential repair, and health maintenance. For addi-
